

Frequently Asked Questions

What is the NAHMA Educational Foundation? We are an organization set up to support the educational needs of children and adult residents living in affordable housing by raising funds and awarding scholarships.

How long has the NAHMA Educational Foundation been in existence? The Foundation was created in 1994.

What scholarships have been awarded? Between 2007 and 2017, the NAHMA Educational Foundation awarded 633 scholarships worth \$929,250, many to students already enrolled in a community college, a four-year college or a trade or technical school. Students can reapply annually so that their educational needs can be supported long term. In June 2015, after receiving a record number of scholarship applications, the NAHMA Educational Foundation announced that eighty-five highly successful student residents were selected from a rigorous field of worthy applicants. This is the largest number of scholarship recipients ever selected in a single year. Each of the 130 scholars received a \$2,500 award for a total of \$325,00 awarded for the 2015/2016 school year. The monetary total is also a single year record for the NAHMA Educational Foundation.

How do we help Property Managers/Owners? By enhancing the lives of their residents, and supporting their personal educational goals. The scholarships magnify the great work that folks at the on-site property level are already doing, which may include Head Start programs, computer labs, and health-awareness programs. We add a new level of educational benefits that can be awarded in addition to any other scholarships residents may be awarded, and the opportunity is seen as a benefit of living in a particular community.

How can AHMA's get involved? The structure for the NAHMA Educational Foundation is already set up, with volunteers in place to assist in fundraising and to award scholarships. We encourage each regional AHMA to utilize the structure already in place, raise funds for education in their regions, and use the NAHMA mechanism and volunteers to have scholarships awarded in their region without the burden of setting up their own infrastructure for local scholarships.
